

TO PHYSICIANS.

N. B. A full disclosure of death is an essential part of great importance. More than a mere "proof of death," it is a revelation, therefore, that the physicians called for shall be given correctly, fully, and as fully as possible.

1. The attending physician must forward a certificate in sufficient time, within 24 hours, after death, in the following cases, within 48 hours: (1) Act of Asphyxiation.

2. All physicians practicing in this State and Philadelphia must be registered in the Bureau of Health, (Act of Asphyxiation).

3. If a person dies from criminal violence, or by a sexually or suddenly while in apparent health, or is concluded by a physician, or is a registered physician has been in attendance for less than 24 hours, or in any undignified or unusual manner, the case must be reported to the Coroner.

4. Certificate must be returned for additional information, such as any of the following diseases, without explanation as the sole cause of death.

Abortion.	Intoxication.	Necrosis.
Achasia.	Fracture.	Peritonitis.
Cellulitis.	Erysipelas.	Phthisis.
Cholera.	Meningitis.	Pneum.
Convulsions.	Meatitis.	Septicemia.
Hemorrhage.	Misdiagnosis.	Tetanus.

(One, some of these may be the result of an injury, and then be a subject for investigation by the Coroner. If it is not, the certificate should indicate that fact.)

5. No certificate giving "Heart Failure," "Hemiplegy," or others more mysterious, unless the cause of death will be accepted, unless accompanied by a satisfactory explanation.

6. In all cases of death from Cancer or Tumors, the physician must give the location of the tumor in order that it may be properly classified.

7. In all cases of still-born the physician must give the date of delivery, or time of date of birth, and must give the outcome of the child.

TO PHYSICIANS

4. A person who has been convicted of criminal violence, or by a sexually or violently while in apparent health, as shown substantiated by a physician, or whom a registered physician has been in attendance for less than 24 hours, or in any significant or unusual manner, their case must be referred to the Governor.

5. Certain fees will be returned for additional information, which are any of the following diseases, which need explanation as the cause of death:

1. If a person dies from criminal violence, or by a sexually or violently violent act, or when attended by a physician, or when a registered physician has been in attendance for less than 24 hours, or in any suspicious or unusual manner, the body must be referred to the Coroner.

Abortions,
Abscess,
Cellulitis,
Childbirth,
Convulsions,
Hemorrhage,
Miscarriage,
Necrosis,
Peritonitis,
Phlebitis,
Pyemia,
Septicemia,
Tetanus.

4. Any one of these may be the result of an injury, and then be a subject for investigation by the Coroner. If it is not, the coroner also should reject that fact alone.

5. No mention is made of "Heart Failure," a "diagnosis," in which more symptoms, as the whole course of death, with the accepted, unless accompanied by a satisfactory rational explanation.

6. In all cases of death from **Cancer** or **Tumor**, the physician must give the **location of the tumor** in order that it may be properly classified.

7. In all cases of still birth the physician must give the date of delivery, and must also give the surname of the child.
