FORWARD

Michael and Isabella Coogan records the life of Michael Coogan, who with his parents, brothers and sister arrived in New Zealand in 1880. The death of his mother Honora six weeks after their arrival and how Mick's early entry into the workforce and his training in ploughing and the care of horses played an important part of his later employment by the Keiller family on Raumai Station in the Bull's district.

Michael and Isabella Coogan is a companion to my earlier publication in 2005 Harold and Eva Jordan Family which records the ancestral and descendants of Doreen Coogan (Michael's daughter-in-law) family. The story records Jim Coogan's ancestry, his life and the publication of photos from the family album not previously duplicated, his children and grandchildren. The section on Jim and Doreen's family has been edited and updated from that published in Harold and Eva Jordan Family

The material has been collated from many sources and the assistance of several organisations. These include Te Manawa Museum, Bulls Historical Society, Rangitikei District Council, Patricia Keiller (William Keiller's granddaughter), Behold the Plains by Dorothea Joblin, extracts from Paper Past, History of the Parewanui District and Schools published in 1979. the obituaries of Joseph Coogan (Died in Taumarunui on19 April 1960) and Edward Coogan (Died n Taumarunui 13 November 1956), the Coogan Family Register by Jack D. Coogan 30 April 1983, condolence letters received after the death of Isabella Coogan in 1927, Jim's war time letters, from the records assembled by Doreen Coogan, my wife Margaret's sister and brothers..

WILLIAM COOGAN

Lawrence (Larry) was the son of William and Mary (Malone) Coogan. William and family, a farmer occupied 23 hectares of land in Upper Balief owned by George Ryall.

They lived on the Estate of Woodsgift Castle on land that had been farmed by the Coogans for generations. On the hilltop close to their home is located "Coogan's Bush" covered in hazelnut trees which were removed in the 1960's, and unfortunately replaced with spruce that did not take hold and the area had reverted to gorse. Known now as "Coogan's Wood" locals refer to the "mean wind" always comes from the wood quoting like "When the wind is coming from Coogan's Wood, she'd be a severe blow". Through the generations the Coogans had improved the holding and built all the sod buildings on the property that have now been demolished.

LAWRENCE (Larry) COOGAN



Larry married Honora Scott on 23 February 1865 in the Roman Catholic Chapel of Cullohill in the County of Queens. Their place of residence was listed as Balief.

In Ireland, Honora lived at Bunlacken on a farm about two kilometres from Cullohill, a small village on the main road to Cork. Other members of the Scott family lived at Durrow. Bunlacken is in open and gently rolling farmland. To the south is Johnstown which is the centre of a peat reclamation area being converted to farmland.

In the late 1870's Lawrence experienced two consecutive years of dry seasons, with complete crop failures. In the second year conditions had deteriorated so badly that a water cart was rigged up to irrigate the swedes. But to no avail –the crop failed. A stressful time, Honora, Lawrence's wife was not in good health.

Seeking a better life Lawrence, Honora and family emigrated to New Zealand and settled in Geraldine. John Scott, Honora's brother had emigrated in 1861 initially to Australia and the following year to New Zealand to successfully work a goldmine. In 1867 he purchased 16 hectares of land at Orari, Geraldine, and worked part time locally. On 19 April 1880, he married Bridget O'Connell.

Lawrence, Honora and family left London on the *Caroline* on 6 January 1880, arrived in Wellington on 29 April 1880 and boarded the ship *Go-a-Head* for Lyttelton. Arriving on 2 May, 1880 they travelled to Orari to live with John Scott and his new bride. Honara's health declined, and she died in the Timaru Hospital on 29 June 1880 and is buried in the Geraldine Cemetery. The family was indeed fortunate that John Scott had already established his farm and was undoubtedly ensuring the bereaved family was cared for.

Larry and his family continued to live in the area with the older boys seeking employment in the farming community while the younger siblings attended school in Geraldine. *Papers Past* (Timaru Herald) records prizes won by Mary, Joseph, Thomas and Patrick at school. Other articles recorded John's athletic prowess in numerous sports and how in 1884 he suffered a broken leg while horse riding in Pleasant Valley. Also recorded in 1892 was Thomas Coogan's injured knee while working and the 1899 fire in

As each of the family grew older they worked in the local area and in the 1890's moved to the lower Rangitikei in the Bulls and Parewanui areas where work was available as farm labourers, the emerging flax industry and as domestics before moving into the Taihape and Taumaruni districts.

Larry continued living in Geraldine area until the turn of the century when he moved to be closer to his family in Taihape where he died on 26 October 1906 and is buried in the Taihape cemetery.





Michael commenced work on farms and developed skill as a ploughman while working on the farm of Mr. William Earl , a well known farmer.





Michael Coogan




In 1890 Michael is listed on the Electoral roll as living in Geraldine and the next entry is 1892 when he is listed as living at Raumai (Bulls). Later employed by the Keiller Brothers, Mick worked on the Raumai Station. It is uncertain as to what year Mick commenced work on Raumai Station.

Mick's brother Edward (Ned) also worked in the area for nine months in 1906 carting flax clearing £300 in nine months.

RAUMAI STATION

Raumai Grange was established by Cornelius Campion on the Rangitikei Block of land totaling 225,000 acres purchased from the Maoris on 15 May 1849. The surveying of the land was spread



over many years and title was not readily available. Campion who originally purchased sections fronting onto Parewanui Road continued to expand by purchasing the back blocks. By 1883 his elongated holding of 5500 acres spread back on each side of what today is Raumai Road. William Keiller (a descendant of John Keiller of Dundee the manufacturer of sweets, biscuits and Keiller Marmalade) purchased the land for his two sons Albert and Edwin who had emigrated and commenced as farm cadets in Hawkes Bay. Geoffrey Potts was appointed manager of Raumai responsible to William who financed extensive developments of the renamed station.

The Wanganui Herald newspaper on 21 January 1888 reported;

"The improvements effected on the Raumai property, Lower Rangitikei, since it has passed into the hands of Messrs Keiller, are particularly noteworthy. Large sums of money have been spent in draining, ploughing, fencing, etc., a large number of hands have been continually employed. The work carried out is highly creditable to the able management of the manager, Mr. G. Potts, and the property under his charge bids fair to become the finest in the district."

How successful was the station? The Feilding Star on 28 October 1889 reports

"We have on excellent authority that Mr. Potts, manager of the Raumai Station, Rangitikei, which comprises 7500 acres of flat land, has written to Mr. Keiller, his principal in Scotland, his intention to dispose of the whole of the cattle on the station, about 3000 head, and to cultivate flax. There are already several large mills on the run. This decision opens a new prospect for the holders of cattle, who will realise in it, another reason why values should be maintained."

By 1890 William had emigrated to New Zealand and was living at Raumai, and Albert and Edwin had moved onto the property across the road, "Fernwood" and were joined by another son Ernest. The station leased a further 1000 acres on the coastal end of their property. Oats and wheat was grown, a flourmill established and the planting of trees commenced which with development by others became Santoft Forest.

In 1905 Raumai Road was formed and the land on each side of it put up for sale. The Keillers commenced the building of

Raumai Station Stables

a new home Atawhai –" warm welcome"-on the bluff hill at Fitzherbert. The site overlooked to the north the Manawatu River and Palmerston North and they took up residence in 1908. This home, which is alongside Massey University, is now a student hostel called Ferguson Hall.

1908. Extract from *Behold the Plains* by Dorothea Joblin pp80

Mick Coogan, an employee at Raumai station, drove all the furniture from Bulls, load by load, in a wagon with six horses. Brian (Keiller) can still see those horses leaning into the collar, knees bent, as they engaged the heavy wagon up the steep road

Mick was highly thought of by William Keiller who at the time of the shift to Palmerston North wrote

The bearer Mick Coogan has been in my employment for fifteen or sixteen years. In his particular line (looking after horses) he is without exception the best man I have ever seen, in fact he can do anything with draught horses and further he treats horses as they should be treated. His chief work with me was head ploughman, but he is a first class all round farm hand, and can turn his hand to any work on a farm or station. He is thoroughly up in the working of all farm machinery, if however he does not understand how to set about any job he is put at, he will say so straight out. He is a real grafter, sober, and as honest as the day. He only leaves me as the property has been sold, and I have no further employment to give him. He is a man whom you can give instructions as to what you want done, go away and leave him for a month, with the absolute assurance that he will work as well if not better behind your back as to your face.

In short, I never expect to have a better servant, and can with confidence recommend him to anyone wanting a man of his description.





To put the money into perspective, the annual total wages bill for 1907 was £1185-11-11 and for 1908, £1394-10-2. The cashbook from 1919 - 1925 has no record of Mick or Isabella Coogan.

Little is known about Isabella and her family but letters found in 1993 records a woman highly thought of by the residents of the area.

With the sale of Raumai in 1909-10 Mick's employer is unknown and it was not until 1922 his occupation as a roadman is shown on the electoral rolls. A search in December 2009 of the archives of the Rangitikei District Council did not reveal any detail as to when he became the Roadman or where he lived. The Parewanui roadman's house was not erected until 1938. The 1935 and 1938 electoral rolls show that Michael Coogan had retired to live at Mataroa to return to live in Feilding in 1940 with his son Jim and daughter-in-law Doreen.



Isabella and Michael Coogan are buried in the Bulls Cemetery. Isabella died on 29 January 1927, aged 59 years, and Michael died on 27 January 1947, in his 80th year

JAMES (Jim) LAWRENCE COOGAN

James (Jim) Lawrence Coogan, the only son of Michael Coogan and Isabella, nee Moore, was born on 2 November, 1908 in Feilding. Following their marriage in 1908 in Feilding Mick and Isabella

settled in Parewanui, on the coast road west of Bulls. Mick continued with farmwork until appointed as roadman. Parewanui was the principal home of the Ngatiapa Tribe and the site of Maori settlements and fighting pas. Jim's early association with the Maori, at school and play, reflected in his

later life in his welfare work and the respect shown to him by the Maori people.


Jim attended school at Parewanui where he completed his Primary Education before going the Bulls to High School. He left school at the age of sixteen and his Seventh Standard. (Certificate of Proficiency at Standard VI dated 9 May 1925).

In May 1926 Jim joined the Post Office at Bulls Postman and as Exchange Clerk. Over the next 9 years he participated in the life of the township playing tennis and rugby for the Bulls Football Club.

A highlight in Jim's young life was visiting Australia for opening of the Sydney Harbour Bridge in 1932.







In 1935 Jim transferred to New Plymouth where he met his future wife Doreen Jordan. A year was spent in Hunterville as a postal clerk followed by a transfer to Feilding in 1938.

Doreen Coogan (nee Jordan)

Doreen Eva Jordan was born on March 5, 1918 in New Plymouth as the eldest daughter of Harold George Henman and Eva Jordan (nee Rudings). An older half brother Allen Leslie McPherson was born in 1915 and had been adopted and was not known by the family. Doreen's sister Delma was born in 1919 and her two younger brothers Raymond (1921) and Bruce (1922).



Doreen lived with her family at 98 Leach Street, New Plymouth, in a small colonial home. Educated at the Central School in New Plymouth she passed her Certificate of Proficiency in 1932 (aged 12 years 10 months). She attended New Plymouth Girls' High

School for her secondary education. In 1932 Doreen passed her Intermediate Examination entitling her for Senior Free Places. In 1935 Doreen passed her Junior Examination for Shorthand-Typists, with Credit. From school she commenced work as a stenographer and Junior Office Assistant at the General

Merchants of W.S. Ward and Company until late June in 1936 when she joined the staff of the Post and Telegraph as a shorthand-writer, where she stayed employed until her marriage.



Christened as an Anglican she was a regular participant at St Mary's

Bible School Class from 1930 to 1937 and worshipper at St Mary's where she received First

Communion and was Confirmed. Doreen participated in the social life of the Church.

In 1936 she had met Jim Coogan, through Don Tweedale, a mutual workmate at the New Plymouth Post and Telegraph Office. Over the next two years the romance blossomed. Together they attended the social dances at St Mary's and shared the activities of Hibernians and the Holy Name Sodality that were to be part of Jim's whole life.

A sportswomen, she enjoyed tennis, loved socials and dancing. Doreen was a keen swimmer, and at a young age attained her life saving medals.


In 1937 Jim Coogan was transferred to Hunterville and became a regular visitor to New Plymouth. Doreen and Jim announced their engagement late in 1937.

Doreen, who had continued with her own church commitment, decided to become a Roman Catholic and was received into the Catholic Church. In 1938, Jim was transferred to Feilding.

Jim and Doreen married on 23 September 1939 in St Josephs Catholic Church, New Plymouth by the Rev Fr A J Heavey, with Daniel Coogan of Taihape as best man and Delma Joyce Jordan, her sister, as bridesmaid.

Jim and Doreen moved to Feilding where they boarded until their home gifted to them by Jim's father Mick was completed at 9 Poole Street. Mick joined them at their home until his death in 1947.

Jim and Doreen participated fully in the life of the St Brigid's Catholic Parish. Jim's commitment to welfare was extended with St Vincent de Paul Society when a branch was established in Feilding. Doreen cared for Jim's father who was elderly and in poor health. With the birth of three children Margaret 1940, Patricia 1941, and Michael 1943 Doreen was kept extremely busy.

Jim volunteered to join the Air Force, became a signalman and was posted overseas in 1944 to serve



at Guadal Canal in the Solomon Islands. Life in the Poole Street home was not easy, with Jim on active service. Mick, though suffering from arthritis ensured Jim's gardens were maintained. Doreen in later life always said Mick was a tower of strength to her during this time. However, with the support of many friends, Doreen, with determination and strength of character, met the many challenges. Towards the end of the war in 1945 Jim returned home and continued working for the Post and Telegraph, Doreen rearing her family.



Over the next nine years Jim and Doreen were blessed with four further children, Paul (1946), Peter (1947), Denis (1951), and Philip (1954). Together they cared for Jim's elderly uncles, Tom and Larry from time to time. Margaret and Patricia remember Uncle Tom buying them new beds and bedding while staying in their home. Doreen's interest in helping other people is reflected in her



involvements with the church, raising money for the Parish and School and St Dominic's School for the Deaf. Visitors to their home were always extended a warm welcome.

As her children married and settled into their lives, Doreen, in 1970 sat and passed School Certificate English. She worked, as a counselor, for the Samaritan telephone service, and for 24 years until 1987 undertook the copperplate lettering on the Dolphin Swimming Club Certificates. Her interest in tracing her kith and kin saw Doreen spending many hours researching the forebears in the Jordan and Coogan families.

Throughout his life Jim, supported his fellow Catholics and the Parish of St Brigids. Community welfare within his work in the Post Office and his dedication to the work of St Vincent de Paul Society was an important part of his daily life. In all this he was supported by Doreen. Together they raised seven children who all married in Jim's and Doreen's lifetime.

An avid gardener, Jim produced bountiful supplies to feed his large family, and any surplus went to the Sisters at the Feilding Convent and neighbours. He loved to socialise, was highly respected, and enjoyed the company of all. He had a great love for

steam trains and in later life took every opportunity to ride the trains. From the time of his retirement, with Doreen, they travelled throughout NZ, renewing friendships and maintaining contact with their many relatives.



Jim died on 3 July ,1989, aged 80 years, and Doreen on 29 March, 1993, aged 75 years. They are buried in the Feilding Cemetery.







Margaret, the eldest of seven children, was born in Feilding on August 30, 1940. Her only sister Patricia was born in 1941, Michael 1943, Paul 1946, Peter 1947, Denis 1951 and Phillip in 1954.

Educated at St Joseph Primary School in Feilding and St Joseph's High School in Palmerston North, Margaret left school to work in a chemist shop before commencing a career in nursing at the Dannevirke Hospital. A keen sportswoman she enjoyed playing tennis and badminton. As a teenager she joined the Catholic Youth Movement becoming President in 1958. Through the movement she met her husband Garry. Married in Feilding on 19 August 1961, they have three children, Mark, Sandra and Ross.

Following her marriage, Margaret supported Garry in his employment in education, attending the needs of their children, and participating in local district groups. While living in Gladstone she assisted as a Mother Helper and as treasurer in the local Play Centre and assisted Garry during his year as President of the Masterton Lions Club. In 1975, after moving to Palmerston North, Margaret joined the staff at the Motor Registration Centre as a Clerk retiring in 1997. 
